GCC's campus was also swarming with law enforcement students this summer, as GCC hosted an historic, first-ever Marine Terrestrial Conservation Enforcement Academy on campus to enable law enforcement professionals from around the region to study methods of enforcing conservation of precious marine and land resources. At the same time, GCC was finishing up its 15th Criminal Justice Academy and conducting the 8th Police Officer Training Cycle from the Guam Police Department, and the 17th Basic Corrections Officer Cycle from the Department of Corrections. The very active GCC Veterans Club hosted its second mini-forum for veterans around the island on June 30 in the MPA. Finally, kudos to our GCC employees for assembling a sparkling (literally, the logo sparkled!) Liberation Day Parade float in just two weeks - what an effort, people! Fall semester promises to be even busier, as we prepare our students for academic success, and prepare our institution for our upcoming accreditation visit in March 2018. Biba GCC!

Over 250 attend New Student Orientation

GCC held its New Student Orientation for fall semester on July 19, hosting 252 new students onto campus and informing them of the programs and facilities available to help students be successful in their academic endeavors. Presentations from Admissions & Registration, Financial Aid, Assessment & Counseling, the Center for Student Involvement, Academic Advisement, Project AIM, the LRC, Student Support Services, Accommodative Services, and campus tours and by the new Council on Postsecondary Student Affairs (COPSA) leaders provided students with a wealth of information about GCC. GCC hosts first-ever Marine Terrestrial Law Enforcement Academy

GCC hosted an historic, first-ever Marine Terrestrial Conservation Enforcement Academy on campus this summer to enable 18 law enforcement professionals from around the region to study methods of enforcing conservation of precious marine and land resources. The academy covered protection of wildlife, marine life, and efforts to halt human trafficking in the region, according to cadre Lt. Mark Aguon, Officer-in-Charge, Law Enforcement Section, Guam Department of Agriculture.

Aguon noted that the different island members of this first academy are also members of a non-profit organization – the Pacific Islands Managed & Protected Areas Communities, or PIMPAC. “Instead of just casting individual ‘lines’ of protection, we have a fishnet-type mentality to protecting the whole region,” Aguon said of the concept of PIMPAC.

Aguon said the academy is also highlighting Guam’s “ridge to reef” concept. “What happens on the ridge, such as burning, poaching, and deforestation, affects the reef. No reef, no fish,” he warned.

Funding for the academy came from a grant from the Micronesia Conservation Trust. Individual island communities also pitched in, according to Aguon.



30 cadets complete GCC's 15th CJ Academy

Thirty young people are a major step closer to joining the ranks of Guam's law enforcement community after completing GCC's 15th Criminal Justice Academy on Aug. 11.

Sixteen of the Academy cadets can apply for their Certificate of Criminal Justice, according to Pete Roberto, CJSS Dept chair. Of the remaining 14 cadets, Roberto says eight are anticipated to complete their certificate work by the end of this semester, and the remaining six in Spring 2018.

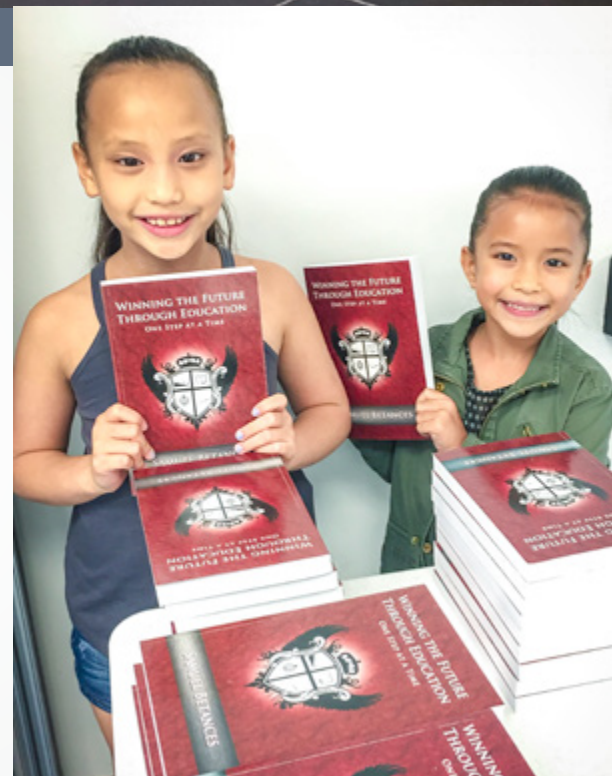
"This academy stands out in that it contains the largest percentage of female cadets to date," noted Roberto. "Of the 30 cadets, 11, or 36% are female." Roberto commended Jonessa G. H. Terlaje for an outstanding job as the first female Class Commander of a CJ Academy.

Four of the CJ Academy cadets were selected by the Department of Agriculture's Law Enforcement Division to participate the inaugural Marine & Terrestrial Conservation Enforcement Regional Academy immediately following the approximately 60-day CJ Academy, according to Roberto. The Marine & Terrestrial Academy and the 15th CJ Academy are two of four law enforcement academies that ran concurrently on the GCC campus this summer. GCC also conducted the 8th Police Officer Training Cycle from the Guam Police Department, the 17th Basic Corrections Officer Cycle from the Department of Corrections.



CEWD Early Childhood Ed Winning Formula Institute

CEWD started its first Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) Training, "Early Childhood Education (ECE) Winning Formula Institute," on Aug. 5 in the MPA. The training was conducted by the dynamic duo of Dr. Laura Souder and Dr. Sam Betances, with 41 directors of Guam Child Care/Day Care Centers and two in-home providers participating. The training is now mandatory under PL 31-73 (Guam's Plan for Professional Development of Early Childhood Care Professionals). Two former childcare students, Isabella and Madison Guerrero, showcased the "Winning the Future Through Education" book by Dr. Betances and assisted their dad, Phil Guerrero from CEWD, with passing out the books to participants.



G-Share - A library sharing program with UOG

GCC students now have access to the University of Guam's RFK Library resources, and UOG students vice versa, thanks to G-Share, an MOU for reciprocal borrowing privileges between the two higher education institutions. GCC students and employees can now borrow books at the UOG RFK Library, and UOG students and employees have reciprocal borrowing privileges at GCC. G-Share extends to participants accessing online research databases while visiting either library. Please check GCC for the book first, if GCC doesn't have it, then go to the UOG. The GCC Librarian can help you search for the book in the UOG online catalog. Students and employees may sign up for the program by taking a current semester valid ID to the UOG RFK Library. Borrowers must renew their participation each semester. The G-Share program provides increased learning resources and opportunities for both institutions!

GCC and UH collaborate to reduce STEM barriers

Eighteen participants from Hawaii, American Samoa, Yap, Pohnpei, Kosrae, the Marshall Islands, Palau, Rota, Saipan, and Guam gathered at the Holiday Resort & Spa for two days in July to develop approaches to increase participation of Pacific islanders in science, technology, engineering and math, or STEM, fields. Joni Quenga Kerr, GCC associate professor of science, and Dr. Michael Hadfield, Professor of Biology Emeritus, University of Hawaii at Manoa, were awarded a collaborative grant from the U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF) to fund a two-day workshop entitled, “Reducing Cultural Barriers to STEM for Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders.” The workshop took place July 17-18.

“Pacific Islanders, including Native Hawaiians, are one of four ethnic groups recognized by the U.S. National Science Foundation as badly underrepresented in members trained professionally in science and math,” said Hadfield. “Yet, with the very earth and ocean changing around them, the peoples of the Pacific Islands are at the forefront of climate change and thus urgently in need of people from their own cultures trained to recognize and determine ways to cope with climate-change effects,” he added.

A similar workshop held in Honolulu, Hawaii in June 2016, revealed that cultural influences often affected students’ willingness to enter and progress in completing STEM college degrees.

“We continued the discussion to understand cultural aspects that hinder students seeking STEM degrees, and looked at ways to develop practical, applicable, and most of all acceptable ways that encourage community support for these students,” said Kerr.

Japan CLUB in Tokyo!

Japan CLUB members, faculty and family enjoyed seven days in bustling Tokyo from May 28 to June 2. The group of 15 visited popular historical and cultural sites including Tokyo Tower, Meiji Shrine, the Edo Tokyo Museum, and the Great Buddha in Kamakura. They also attended “That’s Zentertainment,” a live performance that involved all-audience participation, and made their own Cup Noodle and Chicken Ramen at the Cup Noodle Museum in Yokohama. It was an awesome week of touring, shopping, trying different foods, and speaking Japanese!

GCC hosts 2nd veterans’ mini-forum

The GCC Student Veterans Club’s second “No Veteran Left Behind” mini-forum brought nearly 200 island veterans to the MPA on June 30. The forum, hosted in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Benefits Administration, presented Guam veterans, family members, and survivors with a unique, often one-to-one experience designed to help them obtain direct access to the various aspects of Veteran Entitlements and Benefits. Several Benefits Counselors and a Benefits Adviser were present to assist Veterans and dependents with their questions and/or concerns about VA benefits and the claims process.

“Attendance at our first mini-forum was so good that we were encouraged to host a second event to help not only our veteran students, but all veterans on island, to become more aware of all the services available to them,” said Rodney Cruz Jr., outgoing president of the GCC Student Veterans Club.

Veteran students at GCC number nearly 250, representing over 10 percent of GCC’s entire postsecondary student population. The Student Veterans Club, with help from island veterans’ clubs, hosts several events throughout the year for veteran students and their families.



High schoolers shine with STEEP summer camp projects

The 23 high school students in GCC's Sustainable Technologies & Environmental Education (STEED) summer camp impressed everyone that attended their showcase in the MPA on June 26 with furniture they built with recycled pallets, cell phone chargers assembled using solar panels, and sustainable container home models they designed and built themselves.

"Our goal has been to keep their wheels turning regarding the concepts of sustainability, and to have them exercise critical thinking and creativity skills in a fun and interesting way in order to keep them engaged," said Francisco "Kiko" Palacios, GCC Sustainability Coordinator.
