Congratulations GCC Class of 2024!

441 Degrees & Certificates Conferred; 361 Graduated

On Friday, May 17, friends and family of the Guam Community College graduating class of 2024 filled the UOG Calvo Field House with their excitement, love, and joy for their commencing loved one. Student name after student name was called, making some attendees' hair stand on end and eyes tear up.

A total of 361 students were certified by the GCC President, the GCC Vice President of Academic Affairs, and the GCC Board of Trustees. This certification includes 53 Adult High School diplomas, 47 Apprenticeship certificates, 220 Associate of Science degrees, 56 Associate of Arts degrees, and 65 Certificates. A total of 292 graduates walked during the ceremony. The number of degrees is higher than the number of graduates as some students double-majored.

"I am proud to stand here today and present the GCC class of 2024...," said Dr. Mary A. Y. Okada, GCC President. "When you leave here today, remember that life moves forward and every moment you have can be celebrated with the positive ones that surround you. Become the agent of change that you long to be," she added.

Workforce Development Center Groundbreaking

Guam Community College turned the shovels at a groundbreaking ceremony for the GCC Workforce Development Center (WDC) in Barrigada on Monday, May 6, 2024. The renovations will modernize the facility's workshop spaces and training rooms and add updated training equipment.

The project is expected to be completed in February 2025. When it opens, the WDC will

house work-ready boot camps in providing entry- and journey-worker-level training in the construction and marine repair trades.

Guam has a large U.S. Naval base and is a commercial shipping hub for shipping between the United States, Asia, and islands in the North Pacific. As an island territory, Guam is reliant on the marine shipping industry for commerce and trade activity. There are three ship repair facilities providing maintenance and ship repair services for both military and commercial ships.

"It takes a very unique leader and team to recognize when they have a great opportunity," said acting Governor Joshua Tenorio. "President Okada and her team were able to secure the property and take advantage and to be very relevant with what the shortages are now in the labor workforce. These shortages are in the area of ship repair and there is a growing need and growing demand for us to expand the workforce to support these kinds of jobs."

Guam's construction sector is the second largest private sector, with over 10% of the workforce employed in this quickly growing sector. Construction on Guam is growing as the military increases their presence on Guam with the U.S. Marines moving from Okinawa and the increasing demand for civilian residential and commercial construction. The total value of building permits for civilian projects and Department of Defense (DOD) construction contracts is increasing substantially.

"For the past several years, we have been engaged in conversations on the various initiatives for economic diversification," said Dr. Mary A. Y. Okada, GCC President and CEO. "Through the Governor's initiative with the Guam Chamber of Commerce and Guam Economic Development Authority, co-led by Joe Cruz and Siska Hutapea, construction and ship repair were identified as occupational areas that needed capacity expansion. Through the college's participation in these discussions, our mission to support building the career and technical workforce for our island takes center stage," Dr. Okada added.

The bid contract was awarded in March 2024 to American Builder, LLC. for \$3,270,000. Design of the WDC was done by TRMA+ (Taniguchi Ruth Makio Architects+).

Literacy Navigators Launch Book Distribution

The Guam Community College Literacy Navigators program held its inaugural "Guam Loves to Read" book distribution event on Friday, April 26, 2024, in the GCC Learning Resource Center on its Mangilao campus. Through the distribution, more than 7,000 resiliency memoirs and literature from local authors will be provided to the Department of Youth Affairs' Youth Resource Center, the Guam Public Library System libraries, village youth centers, and the Guam Department of Education public school libraries, as part of the Literacy Navigators' efforts to promote literacy among Guam youth.

In an effort to combat low reading and comprehension rates among Guam's youth, Guam Community College teamed up with Souder, Betances & Associates Inc. to establish the Guam Loves to Read program to support literacy. Prior to the start of the program, GCC partnered with Souder, Betances & Associates Inc., in an effort to continually educate and train GCC faculty, staff, and administrators on the importance of literacy, communication, and decision making. These "transformation" sessions were encouragement enough to seek funding to create the Guam Loves to Read program.

During the Fall semester of 2022, Souder, Betances & Associates Inc. held two bootcamps, each running over the course of 3-weeks. This trained GCC students as Literacy Navigators to tutor and guide elementary students with reading literacy at Maria Ulloa, Juan M. Guerrero, Wettengel and P. C. Lujan Elementary schools.



The Literacy Navigators initiative also launched in the Fall semester of 2022. Promoting literacy is more than a catchphrase for the 15 young men and women who make up the Literacy Navigators program on Guam. In fact, these promising leaders have been making an impact in the lives of young students in the four of Guam's public elementary schools and the Guam public libraries. During Christmas and spring break, the Navigators held literacy events, and at the end of the summer of 2023, the Navigators hosted reading events at the Guam Public Library System libraries.

In the aftermath of Typhoon Mawar, the plan to continue the tutoring at the elementary schools for the summer sessions had to be altered. A Memorandum of Understanding was created with the Guam Public Library System (GPLS) and the Navigators made a seamless transition to three of the GPLS branches: Barrigada, Yona, and Dededo.

More recently, the Navigators are currently implementing the objectives of an MOU with the Guam Department of Youth Affairs. Navigators also provided services to the three community centers: Southern (Haya), Central (Kattan), and Northern (Lagu) Resource Centers.

The dire need for the Literacy Navigators program was articulated by Ms. Gabriella Leon Guerrero, who recounted her experience tutoring a 3rd grade boy. At that time, his classmates were working on writing short stories, but the boy was unable to identify or read the letters of the alphabet because he did not have any resources during the pandemic. Gabriella worked with him one-on-one and by the end of the semester, he was able to string letters together to make words.



Ms. Leon Guerrero's experience highlights the challenge of socially promoting students from one grade to the next, without the requisite skills to learn proficiently. Students promoted, without the basic knowledge needed to advance, only falls further behind with each successive year. The Literary Navigators program provides resources to help these students reach the required proficiency to advance.

The Literacy Navigators joined Governor Lourdes A. Leon Guerrero, GCC President Dr. Mary Okada, DYA Youth Development Administrator Ms. Corrine Buendicho, GDOE Deputy Superintendent for Curriculum & Instruction Mr. Joe Sanchez and the Director of the Guam Public Library System, Mr. Kris Seerengan at the GCC Learning Resource Center to showcase the 7,125 books to be distributed. The program and the books are funded by the Literacy Navigators grant provided through the Governor's Education Assistance and Youth Empowerment Grant Program.

Learning to Give; Giving to Learn: Students Collaborate for Food Pantry Distribution Event

Students from SM-245 Ethics and Stakeholder Management and HM 201 Social Welfare and Development: Global Challenges courses joined forces for a meaningful Food Pantry Distribution Event held on April 24, 2024.

The event, a culmination of efforts from both courses, aimed to address food insecurity while fostering a spirit of giving within the college community. In the lead-up to the event, students from the Ethics course organized a "Concession Stand Fundraiser" on April 11, 2024, coupled with a week-long donation drive for non-perishable items. Over \$1,250 worth of items were purchased or donated, thanks to the generosity of the college community.

On the day of the event, students from the Social Welfare and Development course took charge of coordinating the setup and distribution of items received. Over the course of the four-hour event, a total of 115 participants benefited from the initiative, with an estimated 350 items distributed to those in need.

In addition to providing essential items, students from the Social Welfare course went a step further by preparing and distributing over 150 "United Nations Sustainable Development Goals" bookmarkers that they created. These bookmarks served as a reminder of the broader global issues surrounding sustainability and social responsibility.

The impact of the event was evident through the heartfelt expressions of gratitude from participants. Comments such as "Thank you," "Is this for real... GCC does this for us..." and "Wow, this is great... thanks you guys..." underscored the significance of the initiative in meeting the immediate needs of the community.

Overall, student coordinators deemed the event a success, reflecting on the positive outcomes achieved and the valuable lessons learned through the collaborative effort.



GCC receives \$1.3M from the U.S. Department of Labor

Guam Community College has been awarded \$1.3 million from the U.S. Department of Labor to develop and implement a "YouthBuild" program. The award will support training employment services for young adults and increase apprenticeships in high-demand fields. The YouthBuild program is designed for 18 to 24-year-olds who do not have a high school diploma.

During the 32-week program, up to 66 participants will spend half their time working with the GCC Adult Basic Education program to earn a GED or complete their high school diploma requirements. The participants will use the other half of their time learning construction trades. The trades training will culminate with participants building two houses for use in low-income rental properties.

GCC's industry partner for the grant, Micronesian Community Development Corporation (MCDC), will provide two housing sites for the new construction of two homes with two bedrooms and one bath. MCDC will provide all materials and supplies for constructing the homes. MCDC is a 501(c)3 organization that builds and manages low-income properties on Guam.

In addition to the training, participants will receive a stipend to help them with living expenses during their 32 weeks. The goal is for the program participants who complete the program to have earned a high school diploma or equivalent and be employed through an apprenticeship program. The apprenticeship program will place the participants on a track to earn a journey worker certificate.

This grant award advances efforts to expand apprenticeships and develop Guam's workforce to meet the needs of the construction industry. GCC Awarded Grant to Educate the Next Generation of Conservation Professionals

Guam Community College (GCC) received notice of a \$587,647 grant award from the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation (NFWF). The award will fund a two-year planning period to establish a collaboration between GCC, the Department of Lands and Natural Resources in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI), and Tåno, Tåsi Yan Todu (TTT) to design programs that develop a capable and competitive workforce to meet the growing needs of the region's conservation organizations, with a focus on indigenous language, culture, and methodologies. TTT is a Guam-based nonprofit environmental organization committed to restoring habitats in the Marianas.

The project addresses both the need for capacity and the inclusion of indigenous knowledge and people in conservation practices in the Mariana Islands. The program's methodologies will be developed by consulting with indigenous knowledge holders and paired with interdisciplinary western scientific approaches. The objective of the project is to increase local knowledge and build the capacity of the local workforce. The project's collaboration between educators and employers in Guam and the CNMI will identify curriculum opportunities to expose students to environmental-based careers and natural resource planning.

The methodologies designed in this project will help with a future project that includes a field school, internship program, and graduate fellowship rooted in indigenous knowledge. The goal of the funded project is to produce the next generation of capable, conservation practitioners and leaders. High school students, college interns, and graduate school fellows will partner with local agencies and organizations to tackle pressing conservation challenges. The student exchanges between Guam and CNMI will nurture deeper relationships between communities that share ecologies and cultures but are divided by geopolitical boundaries and historical events.


