

Appendix A: Pacific Postsecondary Education Council (PPEC) Statement on Transfer and Articulation of Courses and Programs

All Pacific Postsecondary Education Council (PPEC) member colleges are accredited by the Western Association and Schools and Colleges (WASC). The two-year colleges are accredited by the WASC Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), and the four-year colleges are accredited by the WASC Accrediting Commission for Senior Colleges and Universities (ACSCU). Regional accreditation not only signifies a level of institutional quality, but is a requirement for any institution to become a recipient of US government funding, including student financial aid, Title III support for developing institutions, Carl Perkins Vocational Education Act, etc. Maintaining accreditation is critical to the survival of all PPEC institutions.

PPEC higher education institutional leaders have worked collaboratively to serve the needs of member institutions as they address regional and postsecondary education. One of these issues includes articulating the compatibility of educational programs to facilitate transferability of academic credits among member institutions. Additionally, the WASC 2001 Handbook of Accreditation states, "it is important for reasons of social equity and educational effectiveness, as well as for the wise use of resources, for all institutions to develop reasonable and definitive policies and procedures for acceptance of transfer of credit. Such policies and procedures should provide maximum consideration for the individual student who has changed institutions or objectives."

The goal of the Pohnpei Accord (signed by PPEC member institutions on December 11, 2003) is to clearly articulate transfer of credit guidelines for students entering the University of Guam and to exchange academic knowledge and expertise in cooperative transfer policies with the framework of accreditation and current best practices. Specifically,

1. This statement makes specific the guaranteed transfer of courses taken by students at the College of the Marshall Islands (CMI), the College of Micronesia-FSM (COMFSM), the Northern Marianas College (NMC), the Guam Community College (GCC), and Palau Community College (PCC). Guaranteed transfer credit will be awarded for courses passed with a grade of "C" or higher only.
2. Students transferring to the University of Guam to earn a baccalaureate degree must finish all courses in their major area of study and must take 32 credits in residence at the University of Guam, regardless of the transfer credit award. In residence means any course offered through the University of Guam and transcribed from the University of Guam.
3. Students transferring to the University of Guam to earn a baccalaureate degree must complete at least 40 upper division credits.
4. All students entering the University of Guam must take English and Mathematics Placement test unless exempt due to transfer credit awarded, or by other criteria as determined by the Registrar. If a student is found to be deficient (this is not expected and should be rare), developmental coursework outside of their major may be required.
5. Courses that are developmental, vocational or technical in nature may transfer individually articulated within a program or specified on a course substitution form.

Students completing an Associate of Arts of Interdisciplinary Arts & Sciences degree from accredited colleges will have fulfilled lower division General Education course requirements at the University of Guam. This does not include the waiving of those general education courses that are Prerequisite to upper division and major courses, unless that specific course has been articulated with the appropriate course at the University of Guam and was taken by the student in the course of his/her study. All lower division, upper division and major course requirements for a baccalaureate degree must be taken unless an equivalent was completed prior to transferring to the University of Guam. Additional degree specific requirements may need to be completed prior to graduation.

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MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

between the
UNIVERSITY OF GUAM
and the
GUAM COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Preamble

The UNIVERSITY OF GUAM (UOG) and the GUAM COMMUNITY COLLEGE (GCC) establish this Memorandum of Agreement to enhance relations between the two institutions and streamline student transfer experiences. UOG regards GCC as an important partner in offering programs to students on Guam, serving differing needs to the community of Guam. UOG also regards students from GCC as an important population and recognizes the mutual benefits of expanding the portfolio of articulated courses and programs with GCC.

Purpose

The objective of this Agreement is to promote cooperation and further understanding between the two academic Computer Science programs, to provide a framework to establish program articulations, dual enrollment for students enrolled in Computer Science, and complete articulation of general education courses required by both Computer Science Programs, such that a "cooperative 2 + 2" degree program is established between the GCC Associate of Science in Computer Science degree and the UOG Bachelor of Science in Computer Science degree.

This "cooperative 2 + 2" degree program will consist of a student earning his or her Associate of Science in Computer Science degree in the first 2 years and then earning his or her Bachelor of Science in Computer Science degree in the second 2 years. Moreover, this "cooperative 2 + 2" degree program will ensure that all of the GCC General Education requirements will be accepted by UOG as sufficient to meet the UOG General Education requirements, with the exception of either successful completion of the Critical Thinking 101 course or successful completion of a Critical Thinking assessment test at UOG, as well as the capstone course in the 4th year, at UOG.

These objectives will be subject to the same procedures, policies, rules, and regulations as may govern the parties to this Agreement, including obtaining any necessary clearances from government agencies, internal administrative units, and/or other oversight bodies.

Implementation

The management of this agreement will be coordinated through the Chief Academic Officers or their designees at each institution. Changes in the courses, programs, or policies at either institution will be communicated to the Chief Academic Officers or their designees at each institution, which may result in modifications or amendments to the terms of the agreement.

The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will work with the UOG College of Natural & Applied Sciences Dean's Office, the GCC School of Technology & Student Services Dean's Office and the Computer Science faculty of both GCC and UOG to finalize the degree pathways and advising materials to facilitate transfer between the two institutions.

Funding and financial arrangements

Implementation of specific collaborative programs will depend upon the availability of funds. UOG and GCC may agree to assist each other with the application to funding agencies for financial support of collaborative and exchange activities. Financial arrangements between the partner institutions may vary depending on the nature of specific activities and may be subject to separate agreements specifying the terms and conditions. No financial commitments or obligations are being undertaken attendant to this Agreement.

Duration of the Agreement, Review, Renewal, and Termination

This Agreement becomes effective upon signature by both parties. The Agreement may be amended by the written consent of both parties. The Agreement may be terminated by either party with a minimum of 120 days written notice.


This Agreement will be valid for five years from the date of its implementation and will be reviewed at the end of this term to evaluate the progress and the quality of the cooperation. The Agreement may be extended for a five-year period based upon the mutual agreement and written consent of the parties.


Extent of the Agreement

This Agreement is not considered to be a contract creating legal and financial relationships, but it is designed to facilitate and develop a genuine and mutually beneficial institutional articulation relationship.



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Purpose

The objective of this Agreement is to promote cooperation and to facilitate an academic pathway for students enrolled at GCC in the Associate of Science in Supervision & Management degree program to earn a Bachelor of Business Administration degree at UOG, such that a “cooperative 2 + 2” degree program is established between the GCC Associate of Science in Supervision & Management (AS&M) degree and the UOG Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree.

This “cooperative 2 + 2” degree program will consist of students earning their Associate of Science in Supervision & Management degree in the first 2 years and then earning their Bachelor of Business Administration degree in the second 2 years. Moreover, this “cooperative 2 + 2” degree program will ensure that all GCC General Education requirements will be accepted by UOG as sufficient to meet UOG General Education requirements, except for the capstone course in the 4th year, at UOG. SM108, Introduction to Business will be supplemented with an orientation and module for academic planning to fulfill the University of Guam requirement of BA180.

These objectives will be subject to the same procedures, policies, rules, and regulations as may govern the parties to this Agreement, including obtaining any necessary clearances from government agencies, internal administrative units, and/or other oversight bodies.

Implementation

The management of this agreement will be coordinated through the Chief Academic Officers or their designees at each institution. Changes in the courses, programs, or policies at either institution will be communicated to the Chief Academic Officers or their designees at each institution, which may result in modifications or amendments to the terms of the agreement.

The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will work with the UOG School of Business & Public Administration Dean's Office, the GCC School of Technology & Student Services Dean's Office and the respective faculty of both GCC and UOG to finalize the degree pathway and advising materials to facilitate transfer between the two institutions.

Funding and financial arrangements

Implementation of specific collaborative programs will depend upon the availability of funds. UOG and GCC may agree to assist each other with the application to funding agencies for financial support of collaborative and exchange activities. Financial arrangements between the

partner institutions may vary depending on the nature of specific activities and may be subject to separate agreements specifying the terms and conditions. No financial commitments or obligations are being undertaken attendant to this Agreement.

Duration of the Agreement, Review, Renewal, and Termination

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



Appendix D: Articulation Agreement with Bellevue University



Memorandum of Understanding Between Bellevue University And Guam Community College

Bellevue University and Guam Community College hereby establish a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") to facilitate the terms of an educational partnership between the two institutions.

SECTION 1 - PURPOSE

This memorandum between Guam Community College located at 1 Sesame Street, Mangilao, Guam and Bellevue University located at 1000 Galvin Road South, Bellevue, NE 68005, is for the purpose of allowing local students to gain enhanced access to upper division undergraduate programs.

1. This memorandum defines the nature of the relationship and responsibilities between Bellevue University and Guam Community College. The parties mutually understand that this agreement is intended to represent a good faith effort to accommodate the partnership and carry out the parameters defined below.
2. FERPA protections shall apply to any student who has expressly prohibited their data from being shared. The reports shall not include students who have requested LPTC place a FERPA "flag" on their educational file. This MOU shall always be carried out by both parties in compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99).

SECTION 2 - TRANSFER QUALIFICATIONS

1. Bellevue University prefers that transfer students obtain an associate degree, or approximately 60 credit hours prior to transfer. All applicants not meeting these standards will be referred to Guam Community College for additional coursework whenever possible. Both institutions will work together to mutually support the needs of their students, and the needs of their respective partner institutions.
2. Students transferring with an associate degree will receive credit for all coursework in their degree program and will enter Bellevue University with junior status. This is applicable for both the traditional bachelor's degree program and the accelerated bachelor's degree completion program.
3. All transfer students may submit unofficial transcripts to Bellevue University for initial evaluation and to be provided information on remaining requirements for degree completion. Official transcripts are required prior to admittance.
4. Transfer students must complete a minimum of 30 hours in residence with Bellevue University. Online courses satisfy residence requirements.
5. Transfer students must meet all catalog requirements for their degree program.



6. The agreement will also provide benefits to those Guam Community College students from a Guam Community College bachelor's degree who enroll for graduate studies at Bellevue University.
 - a. Bellevue University will waive the one-time application fee for any graduate of Guam Community College bachelor's degree program.
 - b. Bellevue University will grant eligible Guam Community College bachelor's degree students early conditional admission prior to graduation from any of the Guam Community College bachelor's degree programs.
 - c. Guam Community College students applying for graduate programs at Bellevue University must meet all admission requirements set forth by Bellevue University. Bellevue University reserves the right to review each applicant's qualifications and make admissions decisions independent of this agreement.

SECTION 3 - OBLIGATIONS OF PARTNER INSTITUTION

1. Bellevue University Relationship Manager will be allowed access to various contacts within the partner institution to schedule presentation opportunities virtually and for general recruitment purposes. Partner institution to provide guidance on the appropriate process and protocol to follow in requesting faculty appointments. Those contacts will include, but are not limited to faculty, program directors, advisors, managers and other school personnel.
2. Guam Community College agrees to provide Bellevue University students and Bellevue staff residing in the local area access to library services and computers in the College library.
3. In the event of any agreed upon shared marketing effort, Guam Community College will provide updated logos to produce co-branded promotional material. Guam Community College reserves the right to review in advance any information including, but not limited to, websites, co-branded web portals, and in-print marketing publications.
4. Student Information: In September, Partner Institution will provide an annual report of associate degree graduates from the previous academic year.

SECTION 4 - OBLIGATIONS OF BELLEVUE UNIVERSITY

1. Local student inquiries in which the student needs an associate degree or equivalent lower-division credits will be referred to the Guam Community College admissions department for additional coursework completion.
2. Bellevue University will create and maintain a co-branded microsite to provide Guam Community College students information relevant to transfer requirements, partnership agreements, and additional information as agreed upon by the partner institution.





3. An annual meeting or conference call will be coordinated by Bellevue University with the leadership of the Guam Community College for the purpose of reviewing all aspects of the partnership.
4. Bellevue University will maintain all transcript records for BU coursework, as well as handle the processing and administration of all Bellevue University student transactions.
5. On condition of receipt of data from Guam Community College, Bellevue University agrees to a reciprocal obligation of providing transfer information on admissions and enrollment, academic performance, and graduation of two-year students. All data shall be provided in aggregate form and in compliance with FERPA and any other federal, state, and local laws relevant to the monitoring and execution of this agreement.


SECTION FIVE- ACCREDITATION



Appendix E: Articulation Agreement with University of Alaska Fairbanks

**Associate of Arts/Associate of Science Articulation Agreement between
Guam Community College
And
University of Alaska Fairbanks**

To create a clear and easy pathway for students of the Guam Community College (GCC), to transfer to and complete their baccalaureate degree at the University of Alaska Fairbanks UAF), this direct transfer agreement (DTA) outlines transfer requirements, provisions, and related advertising considerations. This DTA does not guarantee admission to the university or to the specific program/major.

1. Upon completion of the Associate of Arts degree (A.A.) or Science (A.S.) degree at Guam Community College, students will be accepted by University of Alaska Fairbanks at junior status with 60 semester transfer credits. Transferring students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 or C. Courses numbered lower than 100-level are not included in this transfer agreement.
2. Transfer of more than 60 semester credits will be considered on a course by course basis. Courses with a grade lower than C- or 1.7 will not transfer.
3. In completing the degree specified above, students will have met all lower-division baccalaureate core curriculum requirements at University of Alaska Fairbanks, pending approval by the UAF Core Review Committee.
4. Students who complete EN101 and EN102 with a grade of 2.0 or higher, or other course work deemed equivalent to such, will have met the English proficiency requirements of University of Alaska Fairbanks, and will not need to submit separate proof of English proficiency at the time of application.
5. Guam Community College and University of Alaska Fairbanks may choose to co-develop written materials outlining for GCC students programs, policies and procedures

relevant to this DTA. This DTA will be publicized in newsletters, course schedules and other promotional materials.

This agreement will remain in effect until a mutually agreed-upon change is deemed necessary. This agreement may be terminated by GCC or UAF with appropriate written notification. Each institution agrees to provide termination notice one year prior to intended change.

This Agreement is entered into by and between Grand Canyon University (GCU), with its principal place of business located at 3300 West Camelback Road, Phoenix, Arizona 85017 and Guam Community College (Partner) with its principal place of business located at 1 Sesame Street Mangilao GU 96913. This Agreement refers to GCU and Partner collectively as "the Parties". This agreement shall replace or supersede all other agreements between the parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein expressed, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

Purpose of Agreement. GCU & Partner wish to enter into an agreement in which in return for the promises contained herein GCU shall offer a scholarship to Partner's students subject to the terms of this Agreement. The scholarship shall apply to online and local cohort students who are concurrently enrolled in partner Associate Degree in Medical Assisting and/or Practical Nursing program and a GCU Bachelor of Science in Health Science to be known as the Concurrent Enrollment Pathway (CEP).

Performance by Partner. Partner shall work with GCU to create and make available to Partner's students marketing materials which describe the CEP and provide qualifying students at Partner's facilities with all relevant information regarding the CEP. Partner shall also provide any additional services that may be listed in Exhibit A to this Agreement

Performance by GCU. GCU shall provide the content, instruction, and academic oversight of the above-mentioned CEP including concurrent enrollment requirements, course requirements, and requirements. GCU shall also provide the services listed in Exhibit A to this Agreement.

Terms of Agreement. This Agreement shall be effective when signed by all parties and shall remain in effect until the earlier of (a) three (3) years from the date of the last signature below, or (b) the termination of this Agreement by either party in accordance with the terms below. Either party may terminate this Agreement with sixty (60) days written notice. In the event this Agreement is terminated, any student enrolled in the CEP at the time of termination will be permitted to continue their studies and complete their CEP under the terms specified in this Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire understanding of the parties and replaces all other agreements or understandings, written or verbal, which may be in effect between the parties relating to the subject matter herein.

EXHIBIT A**Performance of Services by GCU and Guam Community College**

GCU offers content, instruction, and academic oversight of the Concurrent Enrollment Pathway (CEP) known as the GCU concurrent pathways (program offered through CEP) through the College of Nursing and Health Care Professionals.

The CEP courses will follow the Concurrent Outline of Courses shown in the attachment Exhibit B. As improvements are made to the Programs, the Program of Study courses may change, however, credit hour requirements will follow the specifications of the current catalog.

GCU Requirements Include:

1. GCU shall grant eligible Partner potential students a scholarship rate of \$250 a credit hour (dependent upon start term) CEP credits (Exhibit B) which is a reduction in the undergraduate tuition as shown in the current GCU University Policy Handbook (UPH) (the "Partner Scholarship"). This Partner Scholarship shall be available as long as this Agreement is in place and student maintains eligibility in the CEP by Partner. GCU reserves the right to change the pricing in its UPH at any time and the Partner Scholarship will be applied only as an offset to tuition stated in the UPH. The Partner Scholarship cannot be used in conjunction with any other scholarships, awards, promotions and/or other programs offered by GCU.
2. The Partner Scholarship applies to all Partner eligible students who apply to GCU for the CEP on or after the effective date of this Agreement. GCU shall provide a welcome page to Partner for students interested in learning more about the GCU's CEP offering with Partner.
3. GCU shall provide marketing literature and informational sessions in collaboration with Partner to promote CEP and support student educational goals. GCU shall also include the CEP in its general marketing efforts and, at the request of Partner, shall conduct periodic marketing efforts specifically targeted at potential students for the CEP. GCU shall also conduct all necessary public relations activities designed to enhance and further the status and reputation of the CEP with Partner's prior consent, and which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.
4. GCU shall provide a local University Development Counselor as a primary contact and Partner resource and information events.
5. GCU will provide all necessary student advisement to ensure student success during the CEP and necessary coordination with partner processes.

Partner Requirements Include:

1. Partner shall announce the formation of the alliance with GCU to appropriate student intenders to the CEP and shall work with GCU to communicate to appropriate students the benefits of Programs offered by GCU.
2. Partner shall provide communication to known intenders for the CEP to GCU and will include GCU in recruitment efforts.
3. Partner shall allow access to present information regarding the CEP with GCU to Partner students via information meetings as appropriate when there are groups of students interested in pursuing a CEP option.
4. Partner shall also work with GCU to provide outreach to potential students, including but not limited to informational webinars, posting of flyers, profiling in Partner's newsletters, and other activities as appropriate.
5. Partner will notify GCU of CEP student acceptances, withdrawals, leave of absences, suspensions, or failures as relates to student groups/cohorts that may affect student progress in the GCU required coursework.
6. Partner will identify / designate point of contact for CEP to provide coordination with GCU appointed personnel on administrative, advising, and student service support to partner students.

Institutions identified in the previous page have varying agreements with GCC as indicated in the following arrangements below:

A to B Agreements (A to B) - Associate to Bachelor (A to B) Agreements provide students the opportunity to complete an associate's degree while working towards a bachelor's degree. Most, if not all, the credits in the associate's degree transfer to the four-year institution, often with the student starting as a junior.

General Education Articulation - GCC has General Education articulation with selected postsecondary institutions. Please consult a counselor, advisor or the Office of Admissions and Registration for further information. It is important to note though that some institutions have college-wide General Education requirements whereas other institutions have different requirements depending on a student's major (i.e. Education, Criminal Justice, etc.)

Course by Course Articulation - The articulation matrices found in this catalog list specific GCC courses that selected postsecondary institutions will accept as equivalent to their courses. Course by course guides are helpful if the student knows the exact course or courses needed to transfer.

Secondary to Postsecondary Articulation - An array of programs, initiatives and support services provide opportunities for high school students to gain college credits while earning a high school diploma. Dual Enrollment Accelerated Learning (or DEAL) and Dual Credit Articulated Programs of Study (or DCAPS) are two examples.

Reverse Transfer - Academic credits for course work completed at a 4-year institution may be transferred back to Guam Community College to satisfy associate degree requirements.
