**Journeyworker Certificate**

A credential approved and registered with the Bureau of Apprenticeship & Training, United States Department of Labor, and awarded to students who complete specialties in various trade programs (e.g. construction, automotive, etc.).

**Unknown**

Information was not indicated on the Student Information Form.

**Other Programs**

For purposes of this publication, other programs include undeclared students, enrichment students and students seeking a Journeyworker Certificate, an Adult High School diploma, or industry certification.

**Undeclared**

A student taking courses who has not formally identified a particular degree, certificate or diploma program.

**Unduplicated Enrollment**

Refers to students enrolled for credit with each student counted only once during the reporting period (e.g. semester, etc.), regardless of when the student enrolled.

The data presented in this Fact Book was gathered from numerous administrative departments and the College's data information access software, known as Evisions Argos within the Banner System. The GCC Fact Book is an attempt to present a comprehensive profile of the entire College. Given the purpose of this publication, the Guam Community College Fact Book represents the best information available at this time.

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# Community College Profile

## GCC's Mandate

Guam Community College (GCC) is a multi-faceted public career and technical educational institution, created by the Community College Act of 1977 (as amended by P.L. 31-99 in 2011) to strengthen and consolidate Career and Technical Education (CTE) on Guam. The College operates secondary and postsecondary CTE programs, adult and continuing education, community education, and short-term specialized training, as dictated by community and industry needs. These programs are delivered both on and off-campus, in satellite programs at Guam's public high schools and on site at businesses as needed. The College also serves as the State Agency for Career and Technical Education under the United States Vocational Education Act of 1946, 1963, and subsequent amendments. The College offers over 50 fields of study and prepares students for entry-level employment in career and technical fields or transfer to four-year institutions of higher education. The College offers a variety of community service and special programs to prepare students for college experiences including English as a Second Language (ESL), Adult Basic Education (ABE), General Education Development (GED) Testing Program preparation and testing, and an Adult High School Diploma program.

Guam Community College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). GCC is also a member of the Pacific Postsecondary Education Council (PPEC), which is a consortium of presidents and chancellors of higher education institutions in the U.S. and U.S. affiliated Pacific Islands.

## Mission

Guam Community College is a leader in career and technical workforce development, providing the highest quality, student-centered education and job training for Micronesia.

## Vision

Guam Community College will be the premier educational institution for providing globally recognized educational and workforce development programs.

## Accreditation

Since 1979, the Guam Community College has continuously been accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). On June 27, 2025, the College received notice from ACCJC of its action to reaffirm accreditation until Spring 2033. GCC's application for the reaffirmation of its accreditation status by ACCJC was approved for a full eight years - the maximum period allowable.

At the program level, the Culinary Arts program is also accredited by the American Culinary Federation (ACF).

## Faculty

College faculty are well-qualified by their education, experience, and industry certifications to instruct courses that prepare students for careers in the workforce. Credentials of each faculty member are found in the Governing Board and Administration section of the 2025-2026 student catalog published in both print and online format.

## Facilities

The Guam Community College continues to modernize and expand its facilities through several Capital Improvement Projects (CIP), all of which are at different stages of construction and completion. These enhancements to GCC's facilities are aimed at ensuring a conducive learning and working environment for all stakeholders and to meet the demands and needs of our community. Below is a list of Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and a brief description of each.

- 1) **The Administration Building (2000) Back-Up Generator Project** is 100% complete as of December 2025. This generator system will provide backup power during unforeseen and scheduled power outages to ensure continuous operation and functionality of GCC's Administrative and Business Offices.
- 2) **Culinary Arts and Baking Center Renovation Project** is approximately 99% complete and has a status of Conditional Occupancy as of December 2025. The project will enhance GCC's Culinary Arts program by providing a state-of-the-art facility focused on stringent industry standards and student-centered learning. The new facility will be a fully modernized culinary kitchen and baking center designed to fully prepare students for this demanding industry.
- 3) **Building 2000's 100-Kilowatt Solar Project** is 100% complete as of December 2025. The savings will be similar to that of A and C, once again increasing GCC's Renewable Energy Portfolio by an additional 3%.
- 4) **The GCC DNA Forensic Laboratory** is 100% complete and has received Conditional Occupancy pending the completed integration, validation and commissioning of DNA Lab Equipment. The facility will strengthen Guam's ability to conduct DNA testing on island and provide relevant educational programs in these professions.
- 5) **Building B, Student Support Services Center**, is 100% complete as of December 2025. The modernized facility has doubled in size (from 3,000 square feet to 6,000 square feet) and will provide the necessary space to house various departments such as Student Support Services, Assessment and Counseling and Security Services. The facility will also consist of a computer lab and other features that promote student success.



- 6) **The Workforce Development Center Renovation Project** is 96% complete as of December 2025 with a Conditional Occupancy Permit pending the integration of the modified electrical plan. The existing structure is undergoing major interior and exterior renovations that will provide a modern and enhanced facility for specific GCC Programs and Boot Camps. This is the only GCC facility that will be located outside of GCC's campus in the village of Barrigada.
- 7) **The GCC Wellness and Maintenance Center Project** is awaiting formal consultation from the U.S Fish and Wildlife Agency before proceeding with the actual bidding process. The 22,000 square foot building, once completed, will primarily be used to house and support GCC Health and Wellness related programs and will also have space for Facilities and Maintenance and Inventory Management.
- 8) **The Arch Type Storage Facility** is 100% complete with full occupancy as of January 2025.
- 9) **The Campus-wide Painting Project** was awarded to two contractors and is 100% complete as of September 2025. The new painting scheme adds new life and vibrancy to GCC's campus facilities. The paint used for the specified buildings not only enhances the look of GCC's campus, it also adds value through the overall quality of the paint and need for minimal maintenance as a result of this.






## Dual Credit Articulated Programs of Study












### Certification Completion - Postsecondary




