The GCC Fact Book is an attempt to present a comprehensive profile of the entire College. Given the purpose of this publication, the Guam Community College Fact Book represents the best information available at this time.

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Community College Profile

GCC's Mandate

Guam Community College (GCC) is a multi-faceted public career and technical educational institution, created by the Community College Act of 1977 (as amended by P.L. 31-99 in 2011) to strengthen and consolidate Career and Technical Education (CTE) on Guam. The College operates secondary and postsecondary CTE programs, adult and continuing education, community education, and short-term specialized training, as dictated by community and industry needs. These programs are delivered both on and off-campus, in satellite programs at Guam's public high schools and on site at businesses as needed. The College also serves as the State Agency for Career and Technical Education under the United States Vocational Education Act of 1946, 1963, and subsequent amendments. The College offers over 50 fields of study and prepares students for entry-level employment in career and technical fields or transfer to four-year institutions of higher education. The College offers a variety of community service and special programs to prepare students for college experiences including English as a Second Language (ESL), Adult Basic Education (ABE), General Education Development (GED) Testing Program preparation and testing, and an Adult High School Diploma program.

Guam Community College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). GCC is also a member of the Pacific Postsecondary Education Council (PPEC), which is a consortium of presidents and chancellors of higher education institutions in the U.S. and U.S. affiliated Pacific Islands.

Guam Community College is a leader in career and technical workforce development, providing the highest quality, student-centered education and job training for Micronesia.

Vision

Guam Community College will be the premier educational institution for providing globally recognized educational and workforce development programs.

Accreditation

Since 1979, the Guam Community College has continuously been accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). On June 13, 2018, the College received notice from ACCJC of its action to reaffirm accreditation until Spring 2025. GCC's application for the reaffirmation of its accreditation status by ACCJC was approved for a full seven years - the maximum period allowable.

At the program level, the Culinary Arts program is also accredited by the American Culinary Federation (ACF).

College faculty are well-qualified by their education, experience, and industry certifications to instruct courses that prepare students for careers in the workforce. Credentials of each faculty member are found in the Governing Board and Administration section of the 2024-2025 student catalog published in both print and online format.

Facilities

The Guam Community College continues to modernize and expand its facilities through several Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) all of which are at different stages of construction and completion. These enhancements to GCC's facilities are aimed at ensuring a conducive learning and working environment for all stakeholders and to meet the demands and needs of our community. Below is a list of Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and a brief description of each.

- 1) **The Administration Building (2000) Back-Up Generator Project** is 99% complete as of February 2025. The new generator system is slated to be completed by December 2025. This generator system will provide backup power during unforeseen and scheduled power outages to ensure continuous operation and functionality of GCC's Administrative and Business Offices.
- 2) Culinary Arts and Baking Center Renovation Project is approximately 86% complete as of February 2025. The project will enhance GCC's Culinary Arts program by providing a state-of-the-art facility focused on stringent industry standards and student-centered learning. The new facility will be a fully modernized culinary kitchen and baking center intended to fully prepare students for this demanding industry.
- 3) **Building A and C's 100-Kilowatt Solar Project** is 100% complete as of January 2025. The integration of this grid-tied PV system is funded by the Department of Interior's Empowering Insular Communities grant. Building A's system further increased to 65 kilowatts in generating capacity, resulting in more savings for the College. GCC has been saving an average of 17,250 kilowatt hours (or over \$8,00.00) every month. This project increased GCC's Renewable Energy Portfolio by 3%.
- 4) **Building 2000's 100-Kilowatt Solar Project** is 98% complete as of February 2025, and similar to Building A and C's project, will integrate a 100-kilowatt grid-tied PV system at the Administration Building. The savings will be similar to that of A and C, once again increasing GCC's Renewable Energy Portfolio by an additional 3%.
- 5) **The GCC DNA Forensic Laboratory** is 100% complete and has received Conditional Occupancy pending the completed integration, validation and commissioning of DNA Lab Equipment. The facility will strengthen Guam's ability to conduct DNA testing on island and provide relevant educational programs in these professions.
- 6) The new Building B, Student Support Office is approximately 92% complete as of February 2025. The modernized facility has doubled in size (from 3,000 square feet to 6,000 square feet) and will provide the necessary space to house various departments such as Student Support Services, Assessment and Counseling and Security Services. The facility will also consist of a computer lab and other features that promote student success.





- 7) The Workforce Development Center Renovation Project is 69% complete as of February 2025. The existing structure is undergoing major interior and exterior renovations that will provide a modern and enhanced facility for specific GCC Programs and Boot Camps. This is the only GCC facility that will be located outside of GCC's campus in the village of Barrigada.
- 8) **The GCC Wellness Center Project** is awaiting formal consultation from the U.S Fish and Wildlife Agency before proceeding with the actual bidding process. The 22,000 square foot building, once completed will primarily be used to house and support GCC Health and Wellness related programs and will also have space for Facilities and Maintenance and Inventory Management.
- 9) The Arch Type Storage Facility is 100% complete with full occupancy as of January 2025.
- 10) **The Campus-wide Painting Project** has been awarded to two contractors and is approximately 10% complete. The project is pending the approval of paint products and color samples by the contractor. Once completed, GCC's facilities will take on a new look with its new color schemes and paint design, resulting in a more modern and innovative finish.





Postsecondary Fall & Spring Enrollment Trends (Unduplicated)





Postsecondary Fall Enrollment by Time Status (Unduplicated)








Dual Credit Articulated Programs of Study












Certificate Completion – Postsecondary




