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## **Community College Profile**

### GCC's Mandate

Guam Community College (GCC) is a multi-faceted public career and technical educational institution, created by the Community College Act of 1977 (as amended by P.L. 31-99 in 2011) to strengthen and consolidate Career and Technical Education (CTE) on Guam. The College operates secondary and postsecondary CTE programs, adult and continuing education, community education, and short-term specialized training, as dictated by community and industry needs. These programs are delivered both on and off-campus, in satellite programs at Guam's public high schools and on site at businesses as needed. The College also serves as the State Agency for Career and Technical Education under the United States Vocational Education Act of 1946, 1963, and subsequent amendments. The College offers over 50 fields of study and prepares students for entry-level employment in career and technical fields or transfer to four-year institutions of higher education. The College offers a variety of community service and special programs to prepare students for college experiences including English as a Second Language (ESL), Adult Basic Education (ABE), General Education Development (GED) Testing Program preparation and testing, and an Adult High School Diploma program.

Guam Community College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). GCC is also a member of the Pacific Postsecondary Education Council, which is a consortium of presidents and chancellors of higher education instructions in the U.S. and U.S. affiliated Pacific Islands.

Guam Community College is a leader in career and technical workforce development, providing the highest quality, student-centered education and job training for Micronesia.

#### Vision

Guam Community College will be the premier educational institution for providing globally recognized educational and workforce development programs.

#### Accreditation

Since 1979, the Guam Community College has continuously been accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). On June 13, 2018, the College received notice from ACCJC of its action to reaffirm accreditation until Spring 2025. GCC's application for the reaffirmation of its accreditation status by ACCJC was approved for a full seven years-the maximum period allowable.

At the program level, the Culinary Arts program is also accredited by the American Culinary Federation (ACF).

#### Facilities

On October 4, 2019, GCC broke ground on the new DNA Forensic Lab located adjacent to the GPD Crime Lab on the GCC campus. The project is 93% complete; the completion date is February 2022.

GCC's new multipurpose auditorium will provide expanded space to accommodate conferences, public events, and educational events. It will support GCC's award-winning culinary program events. This project is near completion.

Upcoming projects are the renovation of Building B to enhance learning environment quality and safety. The GCC Wellness Center project will house recreational and fitness space and GCC Maintenance Department.

#### Hope Amidst a Pandemic

The pandemic has changed nearly every aspect of our lives. It has changed the way we interact with each other, how business is conducted, and how classes and training sessions are offered. The pandemic has forced us to "think outside the box" and make dramatic shifts in the way we reach our students and continue providing support towards their academic goals while ensuring academic integrity, our teaching platform, our teaching methods, etc. As we look ahead with "hope amidst a pandemic", we strive to develop new techniques and technologies creating innovative learning to provide academic and assessment continuity.

On June 4, 2021, Guam Community College President, Dr. Okada, announced the launching of 19 bootcamps in seven months. The bootcamps are designed to provide skills related to fields of information technology; caregiving/medical home health; medical coding and billing; heating, ventilation and air conditioning; certified nursing assistant; surveyor technician; ship repair; construction; diesel mechanic; safety officer; operating heavy equipment; driving trucks; welding; cybersecurity; emergency medical technician; and security.

Guam Community College, in partnership with the Guam Department of Labor and private sector, continue to work closely to build programs that can have immediate impact for the participants and the economy by focusing on areas of critical need to help individuals who were left jobless or with reduced work hours. Our bootcamps are designed to help people start new careers to secure a better future for themselves and their families.

As stated by GCC President, Dr. Okada, "GCC tailors the training, based on the skills identified by prospective employers, working with the College. The goal is to have jobs waiting for participants who complete the training. GCC's goal is to identify them and help get them into the workforce as soon as possible."


























